## **How do we analyze SETTING?**

AP English Literature

"Setting is the natural, manufactured, political, cultural, and temporal environment, including everything that characters know and own." (Roberts, Writing about Literature)

A quick note about a cool word: VERISIMILITUDE (the quality of being true or real)

In order to analyze this element, we must first understand all that falls under the "setting" umbrella. What do we consider to be part of the setting in a work of fiction?

- social, cultural, and political atmospheres
- time period, historical events
- geographic locations
- natural or manmade surroundings
- physical descriptions (clothes, objects, buildings, rooms, etc.)
- non-character "beings" (animals/objects that take on some character-like traits but are not human)

Remember that in order to reach analysis, we need to go beyond a simple description of the setting (WHAT) and move toward the significance behind these choices (HOW/WHY).

In what ways can setting function in a work of fiction?

- augment a work's realism (verisimilitude)
- accentuate qualities of character
- structure and shape the plot—make certain plot elements possible
- carry symbolic meaning
- contribute to tone or mood
